Description

Course Description: This course identifies the public law, regulation, and associated policy that facilitates and in some cases restricts emergency management planning, recovery, and relief. Topics include national, state, and local issues and examples of public law. The course also covers issues associated with intergovernmental (fire, police, EMS, emergency management, military, etc.) action in emergencies as such action relates to regulation or public law.

Course Scope:

This course is designed to give students insights into the public laws, regulations, and associated policies that facilitate and, in some cases, restrict emergency management planning, recovery, and relief. After a brief review of the nature of emergency management to acquire a common definition and starting point for discussion, the class will explore why emergency management is a responsibility of government. This will entail not only a search of historical documents but in light of recent events, including the attacks on New York and the Pentagon, the continuing need for government to intervene. Students will explore how this basic philosophy is carried out in laws, statutes, ordinances, regulations, and procedures at the various levels of government. Students will share how it is accomplished in their hometowns and organizations. There is special focus on declarations of emergency at the local and state levels. The primary learning approach used in this course will be case studies.

- LO-4. Explain key terms, approaches, and concepts of emergency and disaster management policy, laws, and regulation.
- LO-5. Assess interconnections among emergency and disaster management policy, laws, and regulations, and between them and emergency and disaster management and other disciplines.

- LO-6. Understand and apply procedures and consequences of declarations of emergency.
- LO-7. Find, evaluate, interpret, and use published information including the internet.
- LO-8. Devise successful emergency and disaster management strategies that are legal.
- LO-9. Develop basis for working with attorneys on legal aspects of emergency and disaster management.
- LO-10. Trace the development of and highlight the important milestones in the history of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

The textbook and several additional readings will be covered throughout this eight week (8) course. As a student, you are expected to read each of the assigned readings and complete the corresponding assignment. The assignments vary from writing papers, creating presentations, and conducting field observations. Throughout the course, you should keep one thought in mind. Earning a master's degree

requires you to master the literature and as such, this course is intended to familiarize you with the Emergency Management literature. Thus, when completing assignments (posting on discussion board, composing reflection papers) you need to ground your thoughts and summations using the literature so as to demonstrate that you have conducted the necessary review of the literature and to show others where they may find that material. As this course is about mastering the field's literature, personal opinions not based or supported by the published literature are not acceptable. All writing assignments to include Forum assignments require researching the academic literature and utilizing citations and a reference page. Your success in this course is based on your command of the field's literature and your ability to communicate that grasp of the literature to diverse audiences. As this

course is designed to familiarize you with the field's literature, there are no wrong or right answers; there are just complete and incomplete answers.

Note: You must ALWAYS comply with the course writing standards, as they are outlined in the course announcements.

Forum Participation:

There are various required discussion Forum assignments. For most Forum assignments you are required to post a minimum of 500 words concerning the assigned readings. The Forum includes extension research reply assignments. The research assignments require you to do additional research concerning the corresponding readings and your peer's postings. Your peer postings should consist of a minimum of 250 words and utilize reference support for your content. For all Forum postings, a complete post will include adherence to the posted writing standards. The key is to be thorough and use your academic voice to ground your summations using the literature!

Keep in mind that all assignments are designed to sharpen your writing skills and your research skills and as such all writing assignments require providing additional research that support your conclusions. Thus, you will always need to include citations in APA Style (Sixth Edition); however, instead of a References page you may put the bibliographic entries corresponding to your in-text citations at the bottom of each post. Each Forum assignment will require you to respond to at least two classmate postings in order to earn full credit for the Forum. Please submit your initial reply by **Thursday** and your two classmate replies by **Sunday** in order to receive full forum credit. Late responses to the initial response will be subjected to a 5 point per day deduction per day after initial due date. No points will be given for the forum after the week ends.

Note: You must comply with the course writing standards as they are outlined in the course announcements. **Assignments:**

Assignments are designed to sharpen your writing skills and your research skills and as such, all writing assignments require providing additional research that supports your conclusions. All assignments should be well-written and formatted in APA Style (Sixth Edition). All assignments must

have proper citations of any source(s) used and be accompanied by an APA References page.

All assignments must be submitted for grading before they will be considered properly submitted for grading. Submitting for grading is accomplished by:

- 1. Going into the assignment tab located on the left of your screen in Sakai.
- 2. Clicking into the pertaining assignment and attaching your submission.
- 3. Checking "post" button at the bottom of the assignment page.

Thus, you will always need to include a title page, citations and a reference page. Your assignment submissions should be approximately 8-10 pages in length excluding title and reference pages.

Final Research Paper:

Earning a MS degree requires you to master the literature, this assignment is intended to familiarize you with Emergency Management Theory and its literature. Thus, when completing this assignment you are required to research the literature and complete a traditional term paper. For this course, the overall theme of the term paper will be your assessment of the history, present status, and future of some aspect of emergency and disaster management law that is significant to today's world and that interests you. You can choose some policy, law, or regulation that promotes or hinders sound emergency and disaster management. You can choose to present a case study like the ones in the textbook, presenting the program with your analysis and predictions. You may support the law, policy, or regulation you choose, or disapprove of it, but you must give your logic and evidence to support your conclusion.

This project is due by the end of the course. By Week 2, you must submit your topic and proposed approach to it through the link on the Assignments page, and you must get my approval before proceeding. I will not accept any topics that are significantly similar to concepts we have covered in the course in the Forums and in other assignments.

There is no required length for this paper, but I expect the paper to be complete. Typically, a term paper in this course will have 18-20 double-spaced pages in the body of its text not counting the title page and References page(s). You must include at least 10 sources in addition to sources in the assigned reading. The term paper will be graded by the provided rubric located in the assignment section of your assignments section (See: term paper assignment for details).

Your term paper must be formatted in conformance to APA Style (Sixth Edition). You can find the APA Style guide in the APUS Online Library. No other formatting and citation style will be accepted.

Your assignment will automatically be submitted to Turnitin.com for an originality report when you submit the assignment – nothing further is required from you.
