Course Description (Catalog)

This course is a study of the federal, state and local organizations involved in border and coastal security, associated homeland security issues, the various policy and operational strategies used for border and coastal access and security, and contemporary border and coastal security concerns. Topics also include immigration and non-U.S. approaches to border and coastal security.

Course Scope

As a 300-level course, this course provides a higher level of knowledge building on the material taught at the 200 level. The purpose and scope of this course is to enable the student to build a deeper understanding of the discipline.

Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

- **CO-1** Analyze the complexities of the international border.
- CO-2 Explain the concept of Open Markets and Closed Borders.
- **CO-3** Examine the economic impact of border protection.
- **CO-4** Describe the SMART Port Security Legislation, the SAFE Port Act, and the Small Vessel Security Strategy.
- **CO-5** Evaluate the similarities and differences between the external borders of New Europe and the U.S.-Mexico border.

Course Delivery Method

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course resources and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a

Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

Evaluation Procedures

Forum discussions - 25 percent

Each week, a discussion question(s) will be provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to 2 or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

Midterm Assessment - 25 percent

This assignment will not have a time limit and you can access it as often as you like but only one submission is allowed. The Midterm will consists of 5

short essay topic questions and will cover the required readings found in the "Lessons" (Course Tool Bar) for weeks 1-4. The Assessment can be accessed in the "Assignments" (Course Tool Bar).

Research Paper Assignment - 25 percent

Border and Coastal Security. Your topic must be cleared with your instructor first before proceeding. Research paper will be 10-12 pages of content, excluding a title page and bibliography (at least 10 outside references). Your paper is to be written in APA style format and prepared in a Microsoft word document which will be uploaded to both the "Assignments" (Course Tool Bar). When you submit your paper to through the "Assignments" it will be automatically submitted to Turnitin which checks for plagiarism. APA Style Format information can be found in the "Resources" (Course Tool Bar). Your Research Paper will be due in week 6.

<u>Final Exam Assignment - 25 percent</u>

This assignment will not have a time limit and you can access it as often as you like but only one submission is allowed. The Final will consists of 5 short essay topic questions and will cover the required readings found in the "Lessons" (Course Tool Bar) for weeks 5-8. The Assessment can be accessed in the "Assignments" (Course Tool Bar).
