School of Security and Global Studies HLSS508 Privacy and Civil Liberties in Homeland Security Credit Hours: 3 Length of Course: 8 Weeks Prerequisite: NONE

Course Description (Catalog)

This course offers an examination of the challenges associated with balancing civil liberties and securing the homeland. Students will examine critical infrastructure protection, the use of technology, and the need to carry out intelligence gathering in secrecy around the context of civil liberties and civil rights. Recommendations to improve existing homeland security programs and their overall effectiveness to meet emergent future challenges while balancing civil liberties will be discussed.

Course Scope

As part of the core requirement, this course introduces the student to critical elements of the discipline. Students will participate in weekly Discussion Forums that correlate to weekly readings. Students will write an analytical research paper and will write a comprehensive final assignment.

Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

CO-1: Differentiate between civil rights and civil liberties.

CO-2: Assess the challenges of balancing civil liberties and security.

CO-3: Evaluate the impact of security laws, programs, and activities on civil liberties within the United States.

CO-4: Analyze safeguards in place to protect civil rights and civil liberties. CO-5: Critique the homeland security enterprise's capability to meet emergent future challenges while balancing civil liberties.

Course Delivery Method

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course resources

and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

Course Resources

There is not an assigned text for this course. The readings consist of selected e-book chapters and journal articles. See Selected Bibliography at the end of the syllabus for Weekly Readings.

Evaluation Procedures

Forum discussions - 20 percent

Each week, a discussion question is provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to two or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

Research Question and Literature Review – 25 percent

The components of this assignment include a research question, a purpose statement, and a literature view of at least 10 sources, two of which must be peer-reviewed. The specific research question should relate to a general topic in the course. 5-9 pages.

Research Paper – 25 percent

Adding to the 5-9 Research Question and Literature Review assignment, the research paper should be at least 3-8 additional pages of analysis of your topic, not including the cover page, the reference list, and any appendices.

Final Assignment – 30 percent

This assignment is a take-home essay assignment of four questions, 2-3 pages each, to test knowledge and assimilation of the course objectives. The exclusive use of required texts and readings from this course is mandatory.
