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## **Course Description (Catalog)**

This course is a comprehensive survey of the overall evolution and functioning of United Nations peacekeeping operations from the end of the Cold War to the present. The focus of this course is the detailed analysis and comparative assessment of each peacekeeping operation as a tool of conflict management within the unique parameters in which it was established and conducted, and future trends for similar types of intervention and conflict resolution.

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## **Course Scope**

This course surveys the strategy, operations, and functions of peacekeeping operations from the end of the Cold War to the present. Emphasis is on the significance of individual peacekeeping missions, including their background, functioning, military operations, and consequences. While United Nations peacekeeping operations are studied in detail, other forms of peacekeeping are presented as well.

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# **Course Objectives**

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Analyze the literature related to the history of United Nations (UN) peacekeeping since 1988.
- 2. Distinguish UN peacekeeping terms, history, theories, methodologies, institutions, and operations.
- 3. Synthesize arguments and positions in UN peacekeeping literature that are advanced by the scholars of peacekeeping operations history since 1988.
- 4. Evaluate the effectiveness of peacekeeping operations since 1988.
- 5. Create historically-based and persuasive arguments on selected topics associated with the history of peacekeeping, 1988-present with relevant and scholarly primary and secondary sources.

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# **Course Delivery Method**

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course resources and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

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## **Evaluation Procedures**

# Forum Assignments: 30% of your grade (8 Forum postings, 100 points each)

Respond to the Forum question(s) of the week in at least 350 words using the reading assignments, websites, and any outside research you feel is appropriate. Do not bring in outside materials without exhausting the course materials presented for the week.

Cite relevant examples from the week's reading, and use the opportunity to critique the authors' work (you can comment on issues like author assumption, agenda, research, methodology, etc.). Respond to three classmates in 150 words or more, citing relevant evidence.

Discussion is a very important part of the class. It is a way to interact and learn from each other as well as demonstrate our understanding of course content. All posts need to be thoughtful (making good, reasoned, well-written points), thorough (accurate and complete in response), and interesting (responses that are on-point, and relevant to the question asked).

When responding to other students it is not enough to simply state "I agree" or compose only 2 or 3 sentences. Respond to their post in a way that moves the discussion forward, and demonstrates your knowledge or unique perspective on the topic.

All initial posts are due on Thursday with follow-ups due on Sunday. All deadlines are set at 11:59pm ET on the day due.

# Research Paper Proposal: 5% of your grade

The topic of your research paper must be a major concept, event, or person pertinent to the History of Peacekeeping, 1988-present. This Proposal, in addition to a title page containing the student's name, course and section number, and date – and of course, a title for the project, will consist of the following information:

A brief description of the chosen paper topic, short (1 to 2 paragraph) thesis statement that the student intends to structure the paper around, a listing (in outline form) of the supporting arguments and subarguments that are intended to support the thesis, a Reference List of sources the student intends to use for researching the paper – must include at least five peer-reviewed sources to complement any primary sources.

This assignment will be graded on the proposed topic for the research paper, the historical question posed, and a preliminary thesis statement. To create a thesis statement, ask a unique research question about the topic and answer it with specific reasons why. The statement should be one sentence if possible and presented in the opening paragraph of your proposal. Your instructor will approve the topic as submitted or will direct modifications as needed. This assignment will be due Week 3. See Assignments for submission guidelines for the assignment.

# Scholarly Article Review (Literature Review): 20% of your grade

Complete a 3-page review (double-spaced) of any scholarly article associated with the history of peacekeeping, 1988-present. Your scholarly article review is worth 20 percent of your course grade. Every word counts – write with precision and edit aggressively to the distill the most important thoughts.

The scholarly article you select for review must cover a major concept, event, or person associated with the history of peacekeeping, 1988-present. The purpose of this assignment is to introduce you to some of the original published history that can serve as a model for your own research. This assignment will be due Week 5. See Assignments for submission guidelines for the assignment.

# Final Research Paper: 45% of your grade

Expand upon your Research Paper Proposal, completing a 6-8 page, double-spaced, research paper on one of the major concepts, events, or people associated with the history of peacekeeping, 1988-present.

It should include a title page, reference citations (from multiple sources – primary and secondary), and a References List. Sources used within the text must be cited using in-text citations (Author last name year, page) or (Author last name year, n.p.) if no page given. Corresponding Reference List entries should hold the full Turabian Author-Date citation. An example is provided at the end of the Syllabus with the Course Materials. There should be no entries in the References List that are not used in the in-text citations; all in-text citations need a corresponding single entry in the Reference List.

Substantial research other than the required course readings is necessary. NOTE: Internet sources (web sites) should be rarely used, if ever. Exceptions are scholarly websites and documents available through the APUS Online Library. (Wikipedia is not considered a valid academic source). Your paper should have the following minimum elements: a title page, strong introduction with thesis statement, body of the paper, in-text citations, page numbering, strong conclusion that relates back to the introduction a works cited page.

Your research paper must reflect your own original thoughts, even though the issues may have been previously presented elsewhere. The research paper will be graded based on the quality of the student's research, writing, and creativity. **Important note: A paper submitted without a previously approved and graded proposal will be given a grade of zero.** This assignment will be due Week 8. See Assignments for submission guidelines for the assignment.
