# Description

**Course Description:** This course is a critical analysis of the structure of racism, stratification, hate violence, youth violence, poverty and human rights, stereotyping and ethnocentrism in the contemporary United States. Students examine the outstanding problems facing society and strategies for change, including an exploration of the ethics of intervention.

# Course Scope:

This 8-week course is a critical analysis of the structure of race and ethnic relations in contemporary America. The course examines the history, dynamics, and challenges of racism and ethnocentrism. This course will help students recognize some of the ways in which issues of race and class are embedded in ordinary daily life. We will explore the structural constraints and institutional foundations for the creation and reproduction of ethnic identity, race boundaries, and expectations for assimilation and integration. Macro, meso and micro theoretical approaches for addressing, understanding and explaining race and ethnicity in society will be studied. The role of the civil rights movement and other social movements with be studied as they contest and affect change in race and ethnic relations in society.

Students will explore these theories independently and with their cohort through weekly themes, discussion, low-stakes quizzes, and reading memos. Students will also have the opportunity to further investigate a research problem within race and ethnic relations in society through a research paper that includes critical analysis of peer-reviewed journal articles and research reports.

# Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, students should be able to:

- Explain how race and ethnicity are socially and politically constructed concepts
- Compare and contrast concepts of assimilation, prejudice, racism and discrimination as meaningful ways of understanding and studying race & ethnic relations
- Apply theoretically-informed, comparative and historical analyses of group dynamics and social structure to the study of race & ethnic relations
- Discuss the institutions through which racial boundaries and hierarchies are produced and reproduced
