Course Description (Catalog)

This senior capstone course allows students majoring in Transportation and Logistics to analyze specific issues at the national, state, and/or local levels that would include the interface of private and public sectors, intermodalism, global transportation systems, convergence of transportation, homeland security, etc. This course will provide students with the opportunity to complete an approved academic research project that demonstrates knowledge of a selected field of study. The project, chosen on a specific topic, will be completed by each student in the course. [This course should be scheduled after completion of all required and core courses in the BA in the Transportation and Logistics degree path.]

Course Scope

The course provides the student with a capstone experience at the conclusion of core and required courses in the degree path. The course project will include contemporary issues and emerging concepts in the transportation and logistics management field of study. The primary purpose of this course is to allow the student to explore in greater depth a particular topic of interest within the broad thematic topics addressed in the course. Therefore, students will use their research skills, knowledge, and abilities to demonstrate their understanding of the program objectives. As such, the student should be able to:

- 1. Apply systems analysis to transportation, logistics, and supply chain management.
- 2. Relate the multidimensional impact of transportation on the economy, public systems, national and local infrastructure, and the environment.
- 3. Evaluate the transportation systems' political, regulatory, legal, and security issues.
- 4. Describe and assess the strengths and weaknesses of the five major modes of domestic and international transportation.
