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# **Course Description (Catalog)**

This course demonstrates the 21st century importance of strategic transportation and logistics planning in contributing to corporate profits, customer service enhancements leading to higher sales and a marketing weapon to gain sustainable competitive advantage. The importance of moving information becomes equal to the movement of goods. Managerial perspectives are offered on aligning corporate planning, technology, financial controls and logistics performance measurement. We will also gain an overview on the interaction among stakeholders in the public and private sectors in aligning public policy with global uncertainties.

## **Course Scope**

The purpose of this course is to provide students with a managerial perspective of three major supply chain logistical elements: inventory, warehouses, and transportation. The course is eight weeks in duration and encompasses all material flows, from the flow of purchased materials into a facility, through the manufacturing process, and out to the final customers. It demonstrates how improved management of supply chain logistics can lead to improvements in customer service, with simultaneous reductions in total inventory, transportation, and warehousing costs.

Instruction is primarily textbook-driven with a variety of learning activities, including forum topics, videos, case studies, research, planning, and presentations. The course textbook is a comprehensive reference detailing manufacturing planning and control while providing industry case studies and an overview of supply chain management logistics.
