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Course Description (Catalog)

This **TLMT 601 Transportation Economics** course provides the student with a coherent and integrated framework, based on micro and macro-economic principles, for understanding aggregate transportation activity. Issues include: regulation, tariffs, interstate commercial policy, international trade, and transportation exchange rates.

Course Scope

This **TLMT 601 Transportation Economics** course is eight weeks in duration and organized to provide students with a broad contemporary context to study US transportation economics. The purpose of this course is to provide a student with an economical and business perspective of changes in the transportation sector. More specifically, the course will provide broad analysis of the transportation economics and the impact of economics in transportation history. Instruction is e-classroom driven and requires students to complete the following: textbook review, case study (group work), written assignments, forum discussions, and a research paper.
