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Course Description (Catalog)

This course is an examination of the nature of the contemporary transportation process and its associated systems. The course is also a reflection of transportation and geography concerns in the assessment of real world problems. Conventional topics of transport nodes, modes and terminal will be covered, along with emerging issues of energy and environmental aspect related to transportation along with globalization and supply chain management.

Course Scope

The purpose of this course is to give an in-depth understanding of intermodal freight movement. All aspects of freight movements from the point of the goods manufacturing to the final destination will be reviewed. The course is organized around goods movement and transfer and physical infrastructure. We will explore the pressing issues that face the freight industry and the role of government, technology and emerging innovation. The textbook offers quantitative and qualitative research literature in support of strategic intermodal transportation. The methods and concepts discussed in the textbook will provide students with an improved understanding of global movement of freight.
