Description

Course Description: This course is an analytical examination of crime detection and solution, including such topics as crime scene procedures, physical evidence, interviews, field notes and reporting, follow-up investigation, interrogation, and rules of evidence. Specific detail is given to investigations involving homicide, sex-related offenses, and crimes against children, robbery, larceny, vehicle thefts, computer crime, environmental crime, arson, and drug abuse. There is an in depth analysis of investigation methodologies addressing inductive and deductive reasoning to assess the decision making process to solve crimes.

Course Scope:

This course is divided into 8 weeks and is organized to give students a broad context in which it will provide you with the information and processes needed to conduct, manage, and report a criminal investigation. The techniques procedures and resources presented are applicable whether the incident under investigation is a homicide or a forgery and can be expanded or adapted to the investigation of any incident -- criminal or civil. Instruction is primarily peer-reviewed journal article driven with accompanied online lectures and online classroom weekly discussion. Because it is a survey course, it will out of necessity; cover each topic with a broad brush. However, the reference area and online conference room will allow a deeper-look into any subject area that particularly attracts the student. The student will learn how to use published scholarly literature to research topics related to the material discussed.
