Description

Course Description: This course is a study in the major decisions made by law enforcement executives from a variety of levels and locales. These decisions include issues in crisis management as well as interrelationships among community leaders with police executives. Management styles are addressed to determine the most effective methods of implementing solutions to macro social community problems. Additionally, strategic decision-making processes are assessed to evaluate fairness and the aspects of voluntary cooperation and attitudes of all parties. The intent of the course is to provide a thorough analysis of executive decision making from which the student can appreciate the strengths and weaknesses of executive decisions while reflecting on the student's own style and approach to decision making.

Course Scope:

This course is organized to give students a broad context in which to study the history, theories, and responses to crime by law enforcement executives, using a unique blend of both social science and legal research. It will give the student a solid understanding of the integral relationship between the academic and real life decisions made by executives. Current topics are explored beyond just the media headlines in order to examine the implications of our governing theories and policies. Instruction is primarily peer-reviewed journal article driven with accompanied online lectures and online classroom weekly discussion. Because it is a survey course, it will out of necessity; cover each topic with a broad brush. However, the reference area and online conference room will allow a deeper look into any subject area that particularly attracts the student. The student will learn how to use published scholarly literature to research topics related to the material discussed.
