Description

Course Description: A new normal is now present with respect to wildland fire occurrence. Mega-drought, depleted water resources, climate change-enabled forest insect infestations, reduced snowpack, and related impacts have resulted in earlier, more prolonged, and more deadly fire seasons in America's natural wilderness regions. Mitigation of and adaptation to this new normal are important features of protecting the public that students, practitioners, and public officials must be aware of in order to effectively discharge their respective duties. This course will make current and future public officials aware of the challenge, the urgency of action, the opportunities available, and the leadership & management skills needed to guide society during this increasingly critical threat situation.

Course Scope:

This course will prepare students to assume leadership and management roles in the protection from fire of America's natural wilderness and communities built within. Root causes of the situation are studied. Mitigation opportunities are examined. For a final project, students conduct a case study of a historical wildland fire and draw the appropriate lessons.

Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

- CO-1: Examine the role of fire in the natural ecosystem and the various perspectives that can be used to approach the issues involved
- CO-2: Evaluate potential public policy actions that could be utilized to mitigate the impact of wildfire disasters on America's natural wilderness and rural residential communities
- CO-3: Analyze a historical wildland fire event through the lens of modern theory and operations, and provide recommendations with respect to how that fire could have been managed more effectively
- CO-4: Create planning and response strategies given that would protect natural wilderness and the public from wildland fire
