Description

Course Description: This course is a study of the major legal, regulatory, and policy framework that encompasses environmental programs and projects in the United States and with international political, commercial, and non-governmental institutions. The primary learning approach used in this course will be case studies.

Course Scope:

This course examines major environmental laws and policies of the United States. Students should expect to conduct legal research using available tools and to analyze laws, regulations, and policy and make recommendations to modify existing law or propose new tools to accomplish environmental goals and objectives. Assessment tools to determine student learning of key concepts will include essay questions that require substantial research and analysis as well as a final paper that investigates the history, effectiveness, and impacts of a major environmental law and recommends the means by which environmental compliance or other goals or objectives will continue to be met. A working knowledge of legal research is a key component of this course.
