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Course Description (Catalog)

IRLS 493 Capstone Middle East Studies (3 hours)

This senior capstone course allows students majoring in Middle Eastern Studies to analyze specific issues at the regional level including the role of religion, culture, politics, security, economic issues. This course will provide students with the opportunity to complete an approved academic research exercise that demonstrates knowledge of a selected field of study. This is a capstone course to be taken after all other Middle Eastern Studies courses have been satisfactorily completed.

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Course Scope

As a 400-level course, this course provides a higher level of knowledge building on the material taught at the 300 level. The purpose and scope of this course is to enable the student to build a deeper understanding of the discipline.

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Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

CO-1: Examine the role of history in shaping modern Middle Eastern geography and political structures.

CO-2: Determine components of political culture in the Middle East. CO-3: Compare and contrast different social, cultural, and economic divisions of the Middle East.

CO-4: Analyze the role of women and minorities in Middle Eastern society and political life.

CO-5: Deconstruct the major crises and challenges to regional security.

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Course Delivery Method

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in а flexible manner, completely online. Course resources and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

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Course Resources

- There is no required textbook for this class.
- External websites and other assigned reading found in the Lessons area of the classroom.

• Weekly Lesson Notes and videos or audio files are found in the Lessons area of the classroom.

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Evaluation Procedures

Forum discussions – 25 percent

Each week, a discussion question is provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to 2 or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

Proposal assignment - 15 percent

This assignment is about creating a proposal for your research project. It will be between 3 and 5 pages and will contain sections including a research question, problem statement, purpose statement, and others. Details are listed in the Assignment instructions and the Lessons.

Literature review assignment - 25 percent

This assignment involves review and synthesis of 7-10 peer-reviewed sources on the topic selected in the proposal assignment. 6-8 pages.

Final research paper assignment – 35 percent

This assignment is the culmination of the previous two assignments. It will consist of an introduction in which the research question and main argument are presented, followed by subsections with the supporting research. It will be 12-15 pages not including the literature review.
