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## **Course Description (Catalog)**

This course covers the theory and practice of joint warfare. Joint warfare in every major conflict since the mid-19th century is examined with a special emphasis on American joint warfare in the 1980s and 1990s. Students examine, through case studies, the impact of the Goldwater-Nichols Act of 1986 on the Department of Defense and U.S. national security strategy.

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## **Course Scope**

As part of the core requirement, this course introduces the student to critical elements of the discipline. Students will participate in weekly Discussion Forums that correlate to weekly readings. Students will write an analytical research paper and a comprehensive final assignment.

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## **Course Objectives**

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

- CO-1: Examine the history of joint warfare.
- CO-2: Deconstruct the course of events that led to the creation of the Department of Defense.
- CO-3: Evaluate the impact of the Goldwater-Nichols act on the Department of Defense and the individual Services.
- CO-4: Analyze the theory and doctrine of joint warfare.
- CO-5: Assess the implications of future defense trends on joint warfare.

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## **Course Delivery Method**

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course materials and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

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#### **Evaluation Procedures**

The course grade is based on the following assessments:

## <u>Discussion Forums – 20 percent</u>

Each week, a discussion question is provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to 2 or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

## <u>Analytical Reaction Paper Exercise – 15 percent</u>

The driving force of this assignment is to get you into thinking and analyzing military affairs and science. Your 2-3 page paper and specific research question will relate to a general topic in the first two weeks of the course. This stands alone from the research paper.

## Research Paper - 35 percent

The research paper should be 10-12 pages of analysis of your topic, not including the cover page, the reference list, and any appendices. Send your topic for approval not later than the end of week two.

## Final Assignment - 30 percent

This assignment is an essay assignment of 4 questions, 2-3 pages each, to test knowledge and assimilation of the course objectives. You will pick 3 of the 4 to do. The exclusive use of required texts and readings from this course is mandatory.
