Course Summary

Description

Course Description: This course surveys syndromes of psychopathology, by reviewing etiology, symptomatology, and treatment. Psychological, neurobiological, and genetic approaches to understanding mental disorders are considered. Topics also include depression, anxiety, schizophrenia, personality disorders, memory disorders, and childhood disorders.

Course Scope:

This course provides a broad overview of the psychology subspecialty area of psychopathology (also known as abnormal psychology) by exploring the nature, causes, treatments, and experiences of psychological disorders.

Objectives

Students who complete this course will:

- 1. Examine the similarities and differences among the mainstream models and theories of psychopathology.
- 2. Understand etiology of major psychological disorders
- 3. Identify critical characteristics of abnormal behavior and psychology.
- 4. Summarize distinctions between personality, belief systems, values, and attitudes regarding mental illness.
- 5. Evaluate the effects of psychopathology on individuals, families, and social systems.
- 6. Demonstrate knowledge of diagnostic processes and criteria established to categorize psychopathology.
- 7. Investigate major treatment models for psychological disorders
- 8. Discuss issues related to psychopathology in public health.

Communicating on the Forum

Forums are the heart of the interaction in this course. The more engaged and lively the exchanges, the more interesting and fun the course will be. Only substantive comments will receive credit. Although there is a final posting day/time after which the instructor will grade and provide feedback, you are strongly discouraged from waiting until the due date to contribute your comments/questions on the forum. The purpose of the forums is to actively participate in an on-going discussion about the assigned content.

"Substantive" means comments that contribute something new and important to the discussion. Thus a message that simply says "I agree", even if wordy and thus, meets the length requirement, is not substantive. A substantive comment contributes a new idea or perspective, a good follow-up question to a point made, offers a response to a question, provides an example or illustration of a key point, points out an inconsistency in an argument, etc.

As a class, if we run into conflicting view points, we must respect each other as colleagues. Hateful, aggressive, or hurtful comments towards other individuals, students, groups, peoples, and/or societies will not be tolerated.
