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Course Description (Catalog)

This <u>TLMT416</u> - Air Cargo Operations and Security course provides students with an understanding of air cargo theft and proper control for safety and security of people, the cargo and the environment. This remains the focal point of cargo security management despite the justifiably increased concern for disruptions due to natural catastrophes, accidents and global terrorism. Topics include introduction to cargo security, benchmarking against best practices in the industry and conduct of an effective cargo theft investigation with understanding of the role of airport management operations focused on air cargo movement and control through an airport system.

Course Scope

This course will focus on air cargo and its operations and security. We will cover air cargo operations and how it functions within the airport operation. This course covers airport security from ground handling at the airport to airport access. From a supply chain aspect the course will touch on how air cargo is part of the larger supply chain process. Within that realm any disruptions in the air cargo operations can affect the supply chain. The course will also touch on areas that correlate with air cargo operations can such as how operations can be impacted by operational administration and performance as well as government regulations. At the end of this course the student will have an understanding of air cargo operations and security.
